CHAIRPERSON AND CEO'S REPORT

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CHAIRPERSON AND CEO'S REPORT

The confirmation of the sale of Trustpower reaffirmed how crucial it was for us to act when we did to ensure that the rebate was protected for our existing beneficiaries under a change of ownership.

The TECT restructure was completed on 23 February 2022, marking the end of a comprehensive process to ensure that TECT continues to bring long-lasting benefits to the Tauranga and Western Bay communities, while future-proofing the rebate for eligible beneficiaries.

From 1 April 2022, the Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust (newly named TECT Consumer Trust) will retain funds which, based on current financial projections, are sufficient to pay rebates until 31 December 2050. The balance of TECT's funds has been transferred to a new, long-term TECT Community Trust, focused on grants for local community projects. This new Trust will be operational from 1 April 2022, and as such this will be the last annual report of the TECT Group under the previous structure.

We are particularly excited about the ability of the new structure to fund future transformational projects and important services, which serve and benefit everyone in our community. The Western Bay's growing needs in terms of infrastructure, both physically and socially, are only going to increase. TECT can now play an increasingly critical role with this new structure in place.

The TECT team of staff and Trustees will now undertake a planning process, along with community consultation, so we can adopt a strategy to ensure the impact of these funds is maximised and well-leveraged with community support and input. The opportunity to get this right is hugely important. The privilege and responsibility of being involved in this process is fully appreciated by us all.

The 12 months under review will go down as some of the most significant in the history of TECT. The sale of Trustpower's retail business to Mercury meant that, under the TECT Trust Deed, TECT's beneficiaries would no longer be the current local retail customers. Instead, the beneficiaries would have been only a small number of larger commercial and industrial electricity users.

Finance & Investment

Market volatility continued throughout the financial year, and with geopolitical considerations, monetary policy tightening, and inflation concerns, this volatility is likely to be around for some time.

The Trustees further strengthened the governance of the investment approach with the appointment of Frontier Advisors after a comprehensive selection process. The establishment of an Investment Committee with an independent chair (Dr Ed Schuck) further enhanced the governance of the investment strategy. As part of this transition, a thorough review is underway to ensure the Trust's investment objectives, policies and strategic asset allocation are fit-for-purpose in the new world we face.

We congratulate locally-based Purpose Capital Ltd. on their recent win of 'Best Impact Investment Fund 2022'. TECT is one of the cornerstone investors in this fund and it provides a great example of the increasing ability to use investment to not only financially support our own philanthropic goals, but also to achieve social and environmental impacts with the investments themselves.

Approximately 55% of TECT's assets are held through a 26.8% shareholding in Trustpower. The remainder is made up of a diversified portfolio of investments, including a range of national and international investments. With the combined assets, the Trust fund was valued at \$1.07B at 31 March 2022. The key financial results for the year are as follows:

- Group profit before tax was \$43.6M. This compares to \$32.4M in the previous year.
- Group expenses were \$3.7M compared to \$2.9M in the previous year.
- The diversified portfolio returned 9.6%, a strong return given the volatility in the markets throughout the year.

Distributions & Grantmaking

Despite the strong attention on the restructure and the continuing turmoil of Covid-19, it was pleasing to continue to make strong distributions. The Trust worked collaboratively with other local funders to ensure funds were available for those in need.

It is truly inspiring to see the amount of commitment and passion from those that work in the community sector, and we thank all the wonderful community groups for their ongoing work.

TECT's grants programme continued to contribute to the creation of a region from which not only current residents will benefit, but future generations. This community support ranges from transformational projects that require cornerstone funders like TECT, through to smaller grassroots causes that enhance our community in their own special way.

The key distribution highlights for the year are as follows:

- The Trust received 188 applications and approved 176.
- A total of \$10.6M was approved for distribution across TECT's five grant funds.
- \$27M was approved for distribution to beneficiaries via the rebate payments.

Governance & Management

It has been a complex and time-consuming year for the Trustees, who have had to wrestle with an array of difficult issues. Their commitment is very evident in the numerous meetings held throughout the year. In almost all cases decision-making was unanimous, which is testament to the Trustees' ability to work through differences of opinion to ensure the final decision is well-supported and reflective of the various views. All of this was managed whilst still working and responding to the issues of Covid-19.

The small TECT management team faced a year like no other and responded gallantly to the demands required by the restructure, and the Covid-19 environment. A number of advisors, who provided specialist support as needed, also supported the team. The sealed orders from the High Court were the culmination of an enormous amount of blood, sweat and tears from many people, and we thank all those involved for their service.

This was no normal year. The wider TECT team can be proud of what they have achieved in an extremely challenging 12 months. It is a privilege to work for such a community-minded Trust, and we all look forward to the significant potential the Trust now has to make a transformational impact upon this region.

RESTRUCTURE COMPLETE; REBATE PROTECTED

The announcement by Trustpower in January 2021 that it was selling its retail arm required TECT to restructure and amend its Consumer Trust Deed to reflect this significant change.

The TECT restructure was completed on 23 February 2022, marking the end of a thorough and comprehensive process to ensure that TECT continues to bring long-lasting benefits to the Tauranga and Western Bay communities, while future-proofing the rebate for eligible beneficiaries.

New TECT Community Trust

The balance of TECT's funds have been transferred to a new long-term community trust focused on grants for local community projects. This new Trust has been operational from 01 April 2022.

We are particularly excited about the ability of the new structure to fund future transformational projects and important services, which serve and benefit everyone in our community.



KEY PROJECTS AND FUNDING

ANNUAL REPORT 2021/22



Wai Kōkopu

Wai Kōkopu is a programme designed to restore the health of the Waihī Estuary, located between Maketū and Pukehina, by reducing sedimentation and lowering harmful nitrogen, phosphorus and E. coli levels. The project involves wetland restoration, pest control, land retirement, the creation of native plant nurseries, and the repopulation of fish passageways. A critical project that involves significant collective community effort, TECT was proud to commit \$1.2 million to the first three years of its rollout.

Community Insights Lab

SociaLink's Community Insights Lab is helping the social sector to realise just how powerful a tool data can be. The initiative aims to create better outcomes for communities across the Western Bay of Plenty by providing up-to-date data insights that can inform local organistions' planning and policy, while also building the groups' confidence and skills to make the most of the data available to them. SociaLink received TECT funding of \$345,000 over three years to support the continuation of the project: a tremendous/ valuable resource for our local community groups.

Youth Central

Bay of Plenty Youth Development Trust's new hub, Youth Central, is the largest dedicated youth development and community facility of its kind in Aotearoa. It delivers its programmes through boxing and outdoor adventure contexts. The charity works to develop wellrounded, vibrant, independent, and responsible youth who contribute to their communities. With a grant of \$250,000, TECT supported the fitout of the new building – a significant facility that provides a safe and positive environment for our youth.

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KEY PROJECTS



Healthy Active Learning Programme

Ten Western Bay primary and intermediate schools saw a boost to their healthy active learning thanks to a \$364,136 investment from TECT over three years. Sport Bay of Plenty's Healthy Active Learning initiative aims to improve the wellbeing of tamariki through quality physical activity, and healthy eating and drinking choices. TECT is proud to support a programme that empowers youth to make informed decisions and will have a long-lasting, positive impact on thousands of young lives.

Ōtanewainuku Kiwi Trust

Ōtanewainuku Kiwi Trust promotes the protection of kiwi, kōkako and other indigenous species in the Ōtanewainuku Forest by undertaking integrated pest management control. This year TECT approved funding of \$30,720 over two years to support the Trust's operating costs and ensure they can continue to advocate for the conservation of the forest and its inhabitants. This care and advocacy creates a thriving environment for Tauranga residents to spend time in nature, as well as learn about flora, fauna, and the area's history from the Trust's volunteers.

Eastern Region Rescue Centre

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A much-needed facility to meet the increasing demands for surf lifesaving services, the new Rescue Centre will serve as a hub for surf lifesaving operations in the Eastern region. It offers essential training space, equipment storage, and a communications coordination centre for major ocean and beach rescues in the region. Omanu Beach Charitable Trust sought TECT funding of \$500,000 towards the project – a significant facility that is future-proofed for tomorrow's needs and will support staff and volunteers in continuing to keep people safe on the water.



NOTES to the consolidated financial statements

1. Reporting Entity

These are the Summarised Financial Statements for the TECT Group comprising Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust (TECT), TECT Charitable Trust and TECT Holdings Limited.

The Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust was established under a Trust Deed on 21 December 1993 as a consequence of the Tauranga Electric Power Board's Establishment Plan. TECT is a Consumer Trust, the income and capital of which are to be used to provide benefits to Consumers who are Trustpower customers in the area defined in the Trust Deed (being the area supplied by the Tauranga Electric Power Board as at 21 December 1993 subsequently amended to include the Tauranga district area previously supplied by Tauranga Electricity Limited).

Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust is not a Charitable Trust and accordingly may not continue for more than 80 years. On the winding up of the Trust, all surplus assets shall be paid, applied or appropriated to or for the benefit of the Consumers.

At 31 March 2022 TECT Group held 83,878,838 shares in Trustpower; representing 26.8% in the capital of the company. These shares are held by TECT Holdings Ltd, a 100% wholly owned subsidiary company.

2. Basis of Preparation

The summary financial statements are prepared in accordance with FRS 43 Summary Financial Statements. The full financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP), as applicable for profit-oriented entities. The Trust has made an explicit and unreserved statement of compliance with New Zealand Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime (IFRS RDR) in its full financial statements. This summary is extracted from the full financial statements authorised for issue by the Trustees on 28 June 2022, for which an unmodified audit opinion has been given. This summary has also been examined by Crowe New Zealand Audit Partnership and a copy of their summary unmodified audit opinion is included in this report.

The summary financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and rounded to the nearest dollar.

The summary financial statements cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements of the Trust. You can obtain a copy of the full financial statements free of charge from the TECT office at The Kollective, Historic Village, 145 Seventeenth Avenue, Tauranga, 3112 or the Trust's website, www.tect.org.nz.

3. Taxation

The tax expense of \$1,326,500 relates to the deferred tax effect of the current year profit and reduction in excess imputation credits. (2021: benefit of \$2,553,752 relates to the tax effect of the current year losses, excess imputation credits not recognised).

4. Trustpower Limited Investment

TECT Group has the majority of its funds invested in Trustpower. The share price in Trustpower is subject to significant fluctuations. In the two months immediately following balance date the Trustpower price varied between a low of \$6.62 and a high of \$7.38 compared to a market price of \$7.05 at balance date.

6. Related Party Transactions

Bill Holland, Wayne Werder and Mark Arundel are trustees of the Tauranga Tertiary Campus Charitable Trust. There were no transactions between TECT and the Tauranga Tertiary Campus Charitable Trust for the 2022 year. (2021: NIL)

Trustees are required to be Consumers as defined in TECT's Trust Deed and are therefore beneficiares of TECT and accordingly are related parties. All transactions with related parties are undertaken in the normal course of business on normal commercial terms.

7. Significant Events After Balance Date

On the 28th of January 2021, Trustpower announced it was undertaking a strategic review of its retail business, including a potential sale. As Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust is a 26.8% shareholder of Trustpower, the sale of its retail business would also require changes to the structure of Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust.

Following consultation with Consumers, the Trustees decided to proceed with changes to the structure of TECT. On 14 May 2021, the Trustees filed an application in the High Court seeking orders under the Trusts Act 2019 that it is lawful and proper for the Trustees to implement the proposed changes to TECT.

On 23 February 2022, TECT received Sealed Orders for its proposed restructure which signalled the completion of the High Court process. The restructure has now taken place with an effective date of 1 April 2022.

Restructure effect on Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust:

A new Community Trust has been established which will be operational from 1 April 2022 and has recently received charitable status. The new structure balances protecting the annual rebate for existing beneficiaries, and the purpose TECT was established for; to provide long-term benefit for all the residents and communities of Tauranga and Western Bay of Plenty.

The Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust was renamed to TECT Consumer Trust as at 1 April 2022. The intention of the Trustees is to distribute all assets/liabilities to the new TECT Community Trust as at 1 April 2022.

The intended purpose of the TECT Consumer Trust going forward is to service long term rebate obligations for existing consumers. This rebate obligation will be funded from assets in TECT Community Trust. TECT Holdings Limited also received charitable status with an effective date of 1 April 2022.
