


















Dear Consumers

I am pleased to report that TECT has finished the year ended 31st March 2012 in great shape.

Investments

TECT's major investment is its shareholding in TrustPower, one of the five major electricity generator/retailers in New Zealand. TrustPower, which is headquartered at Te Maunga, Tauranga is one of the city's largest employers.

TECT's shareholding in TrustPower amounts to an ownership of 33% of the shares in the Company and this investment continues to provide strong dividend income to TECT.

Gross dividends this year were \$41.6 million, up almost \$2 million on last year's return.

The value per share in TrustPower as at the 31st March 2012 was \$7.25, compared with \$7.20 at the 31st March 2011.

In May this year, TrustPower reported increased earnings and a number of development opportunities, the most significant of which was the potential development of a 270 MW second stage of its wind farm at Snowtown, Adelaide, Australia. Trustees consider TrustPower's pipeline of development opportunities provides a potential for increased dividend and share price growth over time.

Key Financial Results

Key financial results for the year are as follows:

- Group equity increased by \$42.1 million, an increase of 6%. This
 increase was partly due to a change in the way deferred tax is
 calculated resulting in an adjustment of \$31m.
- Short term money market deposits were \$19 million including \$5.4 million committed to TECT's reserves and distribution provisions.
- Group income was \$39.1 million compared to \$33.6 million last year, an increase of 16.7%, group expenses decreased by \$1.3 million, a decrease of 26%. This decrease is attributable to reduced interest costs as a result of the reduced debt.
- Debt was reduced by \$12 million to \$43 million.

These results are pleasing. Trustees believe that TECT is well placed to continue strong distributions to Consumers. TECT's current distributions are among the highest of any Energy Consumer Trust in New Zealand.

TECT's Distributions

This year \$32.2 million was allocated to TECT's Consumer distribution schemes. \$25.9 million was distributed directly to Consumers through the annual cheque distribution scheme. This represented an average tax-free payment of \$451 per Consumer, which is a record distribution. Trustees appreciated being able to make this distribution at a time when many Consumers are experiencing difficult financial conditions.

TECT has now distributed over \$195 million direct to Consumers since 1994, and the base amount has grown from \$20 per Consumer then to \$375 in 2011.

The Trustees have this year resolved to further increase the base amount from \$375 per Consumer to \$385 per Consumer, an increase of 2.67%.

\$6.3 million was allocated to TECT's other Consumer Community
Organisation Schemes, and details of the grants made from those schemes
are set out elsewhere in this report.

I invite you to consider the wide range of community organisations that TECT has supported on your behalf during the year. These organisations make an important contribution to our community and Trustees are

pleased to have been able to support the many passionate volunteers who make up those organisations in the valuable work they do.

2012 was the final year of a 3-year sponsorship agreement with TrustPower/TECT Rescue Helicopter. I am pleased to announce that Trustees have recently entered into a further 3-year commitment to support the TrustPower/TECT helicopter in the great work that it does in our area. A grant was made to the Western Bay of Plenty District Council to enable it to undertake power reticulation at the exciting TECT All Terrain Park at Pyes Pa, and a significant grant was made to the Riding for the Disabled to enable it to commence construction of its long awaited arena. At the eastern end of TECT's territory, TECT has contributed to the erection of the Pongakawa Action Centre, a centre which will be a significant asset for that community.

This year too, saw the opening of the Indoor Sports and Exhibition Centre, TECT Arena, at Baypark. Trustees congratulate the Tauranga City Council on undertaking the development of this significant amenity which has already seen the city host a number of events not previously seen here. We are sure this amenity will serve the city well for many years to come.

Trustees

I acknowledge the Trustees for their efforts on behalf of Consumers during the year. An election is currently underway for three Trustee positions. There is strong interest in these positions, with 23 candidates offering themselves for election. This is a good indication of the wide interest in the work that TECT does. We thank candidates for making themselves available.

Secretariat

Our secretary, Fraser Lellman, and his team of Char Niles, Jeanette Voss and Judi Priest, have provided valued assistance during the year. We thank them for their efforts.

Conclusion

Thank you for the opportunity to present this report. I hope you will enjoy it and will agree with me that TECT is an organisation worth celebrating for the contribution it makes to our district.

SAVING TIME, SAVING LIVES

The TrustPower TECT Rescue Helicopter service, operating from Tauranga Hospital has saved almost 1,000 lives throughout the Bay of Plenty region since it began in 2000.

The helicopter and its expert crew carry out approximately 100 missions each year and are available 24/7 to respond and bring medical assistance to emergencies such as accidents involving: cars, motorbikes, hunting, tramping, and recreational activities. The helicopter is also used to recover people lost in remote bushland, up mountains, or out at sea and is also available for inter-hospital transfers to get people to more specialist care.

Pilot, Liam Brettkelly says "a significant number of trauma patients die from treatable causes 1-2 hours after injury. Early resuscitation gives the patient the best chance of survival. With a fully equipped rescue helicopter bringing Paramedical Officers and/or Medical staff to the scene, resuscitation can begin sooner and continue throughout the flight back to hospital".

The benefits of having a locally-based rescue helicopter are significant. This is a service that literally saves lives. TECT in conjunction with TrustPower is a principal sponsor of the Rescue Helicopter. The Trust has allocated over \$1 million to the helicopter service since 2003 and has recently agreed to provide sponsorship for a further three years.

The service is accessible through the 111 emergency call system.

Without such a service, many lives would be put at risk every year. With it, your community is a much safer place in which to live.

CONSUMER CHEQUE DISTRIBUTIONS

TECT distributes the majority of its annual income directly to Consumers by way of cheques. In November 2011, TECT distributed \$25,875,000 to eligible Consumers. Each Consumer received a fixed amount of \$375 plus a small amount which varied according to each Consumer's power usage. The average cheque amount was \$451. The cheque distribution is of significant benefit to Consumers and provides a huge cash injection into the local economy. To be eligible for the TECT cheque, you must be a TrustPower customer in TECT's District (basically in the Tauranga City or Western Bay of Plenty region) and have an active TrustPower power account continuously from 1 April to 30 September. This year each eligible

Consumer will receive a fixed base amount of \$385 plus a portion based on power usage with cheques being mailed out in November.



TRUST GOVERNANCE

TECT and its subsidiary TECT Charitable Trust operate under Deeds of Trust respectively dated 21 December 1993 and 27 March 2002. Provisions of the Electricity Amendment Act 2001 also impact upon Trust Governance.

TECT is governed by six Trustees who are elected by Consumers for 4-year terms. The terms of appointment of Trustees are staggered so that three Trustees retire every 2 years. The current Trustees

are Michael Cooney (Chair), Bruce Cronin (Deputy Chair), Ken Collings, Dame Susan Devoy, Mark Groos and Ron Scott. Trustees are responsible for managing TECT's assets for the benefit of qualifying Consumers. Trustee conduct is governed by a Code of Practice which is published on TECT's website.

The day-to-day operations of TECT are managed by the Trust Secretariat, Mr Fraser Lellman, BDO Tauranga Limited, Chartered Accountants.

NOTES TO THE SUMMARISED CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2012

1. REPORTING ENTITY

These are the Summarised Financial Statements for the TECT Group comprising Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust ("TECT"), TECT Charitable Trust, TECT Holdings Limited, TECT Finance Limited and TECT Finance No. 2 Limited.

The Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust was established under a Trust Deed on 21 December 1993 as a consequence of the Tauranga Electric Power Board's Establishment Plan. TECT is a Consumer Trust, the income and capital of which are to be used to provide benefits to Consumers who are TrustPower customers in the area defined in the Trust Deed (being the area supplied by the Tauranga Electric Power Board as at 21 December 1993 subsequently amended to include the Tauranga district area previously supplied by Tauranga Electricity Limited).

TECT is not a Charitable Trust and accordingly may not continue for more than 80 years. On the winding up of the Trust the assets of the Trust, which remain, will be distributed for the benefit of Consumers.

TECT Group holds 103,878,838 shares, representing 33% in the capital of TrustPower Limited.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The summary financial statements are prepared in accordance with FRS 43 Summary Financial Statements. The full financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP), as applicable for profit-oriented entities. The Trust has made an explicit and unreserved statement of compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in its full financial statements.

This summary is extracted from the full financial statements authorised for issue by the Trustees on 19 June 2012, for which an unqualified audit opinion has been given. This summary has also been examined by KPMG and a copy of their summary unqualified audit opinion is included in this report.

The summary financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and rounded to the nearest dollar.

The summary financial statements cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements of the Trust. You can obtain a copy of the full financial statements free of charge from the TECT office at 96 Cameron Road, Tauranga 3141 or the Trust's website, www.tect.org.nz.

3. TAXATION

The tax expense of \$771,338 relates to current group tax charges of \$13,753,482 less dividend Imputation Tax Credits of \$12,959,551 and prior period adjustment of \$22,593.

4. DEFERRED TAX

Deferred Tax shown in the Statement of Financial Position arises primarily from revaluation of financial instruments to fair value. During 2012 a re-estimation of the deferred tax liability arising in relation to the fair value movements in TrustPower shares was made, which was based around the level of imputation credits likely to be attached to future dividends. The Trustees now consider there is more clarity and certainty about the level of imputation credits which will likely be attached to dividends received. This resulted in a reduction in the deferred tax liability provided on the fair value adjustment of \$31,236,093. The estimated level of imputation credits will be reviewed at each reporting date.

5. IMPUTATION CREDITS

As TECT is not a company it does not have an Imputation Credit account. TECT Holdings Limited, TECT Finance Limited and TECT Finance No. 2 Limited are registered as an Imputation Group. As at 31 March 2012 the Group had Imputation Credits available of \$30,361,143 (2011: \$16,641,276).

6. COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

TECT Group had no commitments or contingencies at the end of the financial year other than those disclosed in the Statement of Financial Position (2011 Nil).

7. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Mr Michael Cooney is Chairperson of Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust and TECT Charitable Trust. He is a Director of TECT Holdings Ltd, TECT Finance Ltd and TECT Finance No. 2 Ltd and is also a director of TrustPower Ltd. Net dividends received by TECT Group from TrustPower Ltd during the year ended 31 March 2012 totalled \$41,551,535 (2011: \$39,473,958). At 31 March 2012 the TECT Group shareholding in TrustPower Ltd was 103,878,838 shares valued at \$7.25 per share (2011: \$7.20) or a total value of \$753,121,576 (2011: \$747,927,634).

Trustees are required to be Consumers as defined in TECT's Trust Deed and are therefore beneficiaries of TECT and accordingly are related parties. All transactions with related parties are undertaken in the normal course of business on normal commercial terms.

8. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON THE SUMMARY FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

To the Trustees of Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust

The accompanying summary financial statements shown above, which comprise the summary statements of financial position as at 31 March 2012, the summary statements of comprehensive income, changes in trust equity and cash flows for the year then ended, and notes, are derived from the audited financial statements of Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust and its subsidiaries ("the group") for the year ended 31 March 2012. We expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those financial statements in our report dated 19 June 2012.

The summary financial statements do not contain all the disclosures required for full financial statements under generally accepted accounting practice in New Zealand. Reading the summary financial statements, therefore, is not a substitute for reading the audited financial statements of the group.
