TRUST GOVERNANCE

TECT is governed by six trustees who are elected by beneficiaries for four-year terms.

The terms of appointment of trustees are staggered so that three trustees retire every two years. The current trustees are Bill Holland (Chairperson), Natalie Bridges (Deputy Chairperson), Peter Blackwell, Amanda Sutcliffe, Mark Arundel and Tina Jennen. Trustees are responsible for managing TECT's assets for the benefit of qualifying beneficiaries.

TECT and TECT Charitable Trust operate under Deeds of Trust respectively dated 21 December 1993 and 27 March 2002. Provisions of the Electricity Amendment Act 2001 also impact upon Trust Governance.

CHAIRPERSON AND GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

It is with great pleasure that we are able to report on another successful year for the trust and to present the annual report for the TECT group of entities.

The trust was created in 1993 as part of the electricity reforms. The community at the time approved an establishment plan which saw approximately 50% of the proceeds from the winding up of the Tauranga Electric Power Board distributed to individuals. Rather than taking the remaining 50% for themselves, the decision was made to vest the proceeds in a trust which was to become TECT. The trust deed was written to provide trustees with a range of methods by which they could deliver benefits to our community.

The trust has evolved significantly over the past 26 years, and this year was no different. In 2018 we had a great debate over whether to shift the focus of the trust to community rather than rebates, and had a significant response to a special distribution that showed a renewed vote of confidence for transformational grant making.

That we debate such notions relating to the future of the trust is critical—if only for the fact that TECT is now one of New Zealand's largest trusts, boasting net assets of \$921M. The responsibility that comes with protecting such an asset for future generations in the Western Bay of Plenty means questions need to be continually asked about how its purpose to serve our community is secure.

Finance & Investment

TECT administers a diverse portfolio of investments. Approximately 40% of the assets are held in a diversified

portfolio including a range of national and international investments. The remainder is made up of a shareholding in Trustpower, of which Infratil own 51% and TECT own 26%. Together total assets were valued at \$944M as at 31 March 2019.

The key financial results for the year are as follows:

- Group profit before tax was \$55.3M. This compares to \$45.2M in the previous year.
- Group expenses were \$1.8M compared to \$1.6M in the previous year. The main contributors to the increase were election costs, and the cost of closing out a SWAP held by the trust.
- Group equity increased by \$145M to \$921M.
- In the year under review TECT sold its shareholding in TILT Renewables for \$2.30 per share, a significant premium on the closing price of \$1.85. The proceeds have allowed TECT to further diversify its investment portfolio.
- The diversified portfolio returned 6.7% and has returned on average 9.2% since inception. The returns were dragged down by the amount of cash held after the sale of the TILT Renewables shares.

Distributions & Grant Making

TECT was once again this year able to support many worthy community initiatives and organisations. Many of our local amenities and community organisations that enrich our region exist thanks to TECT. Over 3000 grants have been made to community initiatives since 1993.

Alongside the TECT rebate, which is paid to TECT beneficiaries each year, transformational grants provide intergenerational impact that can be seen and measured throughout our





community. TECT's community support reaches from grassroots organisations and causes that would otherwise find it hard to qualify for funding elsewhere, right through to transformational projects that equally need TECT to get off the ground.

The Western Bay's growth requires a major funder like TECT to keep up with the demand for amenities and supporting community groups. With the extreme growth and changes in the population demographic, the needs of our community have also changed, and it's our role to understand those needs to ensure the best use of our grant dollars.

It is humbling to see the commitment and passion of those that work in the community sector and we thank all the wonderful community groups for their ongoing work.



CHAIRPERSON AND GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

The key distribution highlights for the year are as follows:

- The trust received 216 applications and approved 205.
- Total of \$7.3M distributed across TECT's five grant funds.
- The opening of the Tertiary Campus signalled the start of an exciting era for tertiary education in the region.
 TECT's \$15M grant is the largest in the trust's history.
- In November 2018 \$28M was distributed to beneficiaries via the TECT rebate. After consultation with beneficiaries in early 2019, \$30M was committed for distribution in November 2019. A further \$16.8M was allocated for payment as a special rebate in July 2019.
- From 2019 eligible beneficiaries now have the option to receive their TECT rebate direct into their bank account. There will be no more rebate payments via cheque.

Governance & Management

The success of every organisation comes from the hard work and commitment of everyone involved. Our thanks go to all those who have worked with TECT including the staff, trustees, and advisors for their ongoing contribution and dedication to the trust.

TECT operates with six trustees who are charged with providing the governance and policy direction for the organisation. The biennial elections were completed in July 2018 with 19 candidates vying for the three positions available. This once again shows the significant interest in TECT from the community.

Thank you to all the candidates for making themselves available for election, and congratulations to Tina Jennen, Mark Arundel and Peter Blackwell who were duly elected. The election saw the retirement of Paul Tustin and Ron Scott and we thank them for their long service.

Looking Ahead

Of interest are the proposed trust law changes. Currently, trusts like TECT have a time limit of 80 years. The draft legislation suggests extending this to 125 years, which would permit TECT to automatically extend the length of the trust beyond 2073. The permission in the trust deed to make this change is a signal of the intention for the trust to provide benefit well into the future, and trustees firmly believe they have a responsibility to secure this fund so that future generations can continue to prosper.

We are also aware of the observations relating to the relationship between Trustpower and TECT in the NZ Electricity Price Review. Over the years, the community has raised this issue with the trustees and it was also a significant theme in recent beneficiary consultations. Trustees will continue to monitor pricing and engage with Trustpower on this as a 26.8% shareholder.

A recent consumer consultation showed there is a keen interest on both sides of the spectrum for how TECT distributes its money. The feedback also showed that many in the community are unclear about the fact TECT and Trustpower are two completely separate entities and as a result there is widespread misunderstanding about the nature, intentions and purpose of the trust. The trustees are committed to ensuring TECT beneficiaries better understand where the trust's money comes from, as well as the range of ways the trust may continue to benefit its beneficiaries through distribution of the funds in the Western Bay.

The trustees will need to continually monitor future trends, opportunities and threats as part of their duty to ensure the trust is future-proofed in the ever-evolving world in which we live. It is a privilege to work for the trust and we continue to strive to make a positive impact in our region.








TRANSFORMING OUR COMMUNITY

REBATE PAYMENTS

In November 2018 TECT distributed \$28M to eligible beneficiaries. The average rebate was \$505.

We also implemented a new rebate payment approach that will provide trust beneficiaries with more choice. While we will no longer be sending the rebate via cheque, there are now three different rebate payment options to choose from:



Rebate paid directly into bank account:

The rebate will be paid directly into a nominated bank account.

Rebate credited to power account:

The rebate will be credited into the power account. This will be the default payment option if no selection is made.

Rebate gifted: The rebate can be gifted to the Acorn Foundation Vital Impact Fund.

All future rebates will be paid via the payment option selected. Beneficiaries can change their rebate payment option up to six weeks prior to each rebate payment date.

To the Summarised Consolidated Financial Statements for the year ended 31 March 2019

1. REPORTING ENTITY

These are the Summarised Financial Statements for the TECT Group comprising Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust ("TECT"), TECT Charitable Trust, TECT Holdings Limited and TECT Property Limited.

The Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust was established under a Trust Deed on 21 December 1993 as a consequence of the Tauranga Electric Power Board's Establishment Plan.

TECT is a Consumer Trust, the income and capital of which are to be used to provide benefits to Consumers who are Trustpower customers in the area defined in the Trust Deed (being the area supplied by the Tauranga Electric Power Board as at 21 December 1993 subsequently amended to include the Tauranga district area previously supplied by Tauranga Electricity Limited).

TECT is not a Charitable Trust and accordingly may not continue for more than 80 years. On the winding up of the Trust the assets of the Trust, which remain, will be distributed for the benefit of Consumers.

At 31 March 2019 TECT Group held 83,878,838 shares in Trustpower; representing 26.8% in the capital of the company. These shares are held by TECT Holdings Ltd, a 100% wholly owned subsidiary company.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION

The summary financial statements are prepared in accordance with FRS 43 Summary Financial Statements. The full financial statements have been prepared in accordance with New Zealand Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (NZ GAAP), as applicable for profit-oriented entities. The Trust has made an explicit and unreserved statement of compliance with

New Zealand Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime (IFRS RDR) in its full financial statements.

This summary is extracted from the full financial statements authorised for issue by the Trustees on 18 June 2019, for which an unmodified audit opinion has been given. This summary has also been examined by Crowe Horwath New Zealand Audit Partnership and a copy of their summary unmodified audit opinion is included in this report.

The summary financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars and rounded to the nearest dollar.

The summary financial statements cannot be expected to provide as complete an understanding as provided by the full financial statements of the Trust.

3. TAXATION

Tax benefit of \$2,267,626 relates to the tax effect of the current year tax losses and excess imputation credits not recognised.

4. TRUSTPOWER AND TILT RENEWABLES INVESTMENT

TECT Group has the majority of its funds invested in Trustpower. The share price in Trustpower is subject to significant fluctuations. In the two months immediately following balance date the Trustpower price varied between a low of \$6.64 and a high of \$7.41 compared to a market price of \$6.61 at balance date.

In May 2018 The Tauranga Energy Consumer Trust (TECT) sold 74.59% of its 26.8% holding in Tilt Renewables to Mercury New Zealand for \$2.30 per share. The price of \$2.30 represents a significant premium of 24.3% over the closing price of \$1.85 at 31 May 2018. In September 2018 the remaining shares were sold to Mercury at the same price.

Total proceeds from this divestment was \$193M and Trustees have signalled their intention to utilise the funds realised to further diversify their investments.

6. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Mr Bill Holland is a Trustee of TECT and TECT Charitable Trust. Mr Holland is also a Partner in the law firm Holland Beckett. TECT Charitable Trust has entered into an agreement with Spoke Investments Limited (a company associated with Holland Beckett) to lease premises at an annual cost of \$48,000 (excluding GST). This Lease was terminated in October 2018 following completion of the Kollective, owned by TECT Charitable Trust, where TECT is now based.

Trustees are required to be Consumers as defined in TECT's Trust Deed and are therefore beneficiaries of TECT and accordingly are related parties. All transactions with related parties are undertaken in the normal course of business on normal commercial terms.
